Creating a Culture of Safety

FAIL









- Walk confidently
- Avoid using cellphones or IPOD's. Stay alert!
- Offenders do not want to get caught-they pick easy, unsuspecting, targets.







- Don't wear flashy clothing or accessories
- Keep to well traveled areas











# AVOID UNFAMILIAR AREAS AND SHORTCUTS

- Use the "Buddy System."
- Walk in the middle of the sidewalk
- No sidewalk Walk facing traffic







 If you feel you are being followed. Change directions or enter a store or area with lots of people.







• PERSONAL ALARMS







- Carrying bear spray, or any other object, that you intend to use as a weapon against another individual is illegal in Canada.
- Regardless if it is for personal protection.
   You can be arrested and charged!







• Limit your methods of payment required for your outing. Carry Only what your need!



• Small amounts of cash Or debit card.









## **PURSES**

- ALWAYS ASSOCIATED WITH MONEY BY CRIMINALS!
- Carry a wallet instead
- Remove important I.D
- Don't carry with strap over neck or wrapped around wrist.







## <u>ROBBERY</u>

If you are robbed.....COOPERATE !!

YOUR LIFE AND PERSONAL SAFETY ARE MORE IMPORTANT THAN PROPERTY !!







## **CELL PHONE SAFETY TIPS**

- Do Not disclose the relationship between you and the people on your Contact List
- Avoid using names like Home, Sweetheart, Dad, Mom, Etc.







# When sensitive information is being asked through texts

Confirm it by calling back!

This includes "meet me at...."

## A short while later his Wife Calls

To let him know that she just discovered her purse was stolen. In it was her cell phone and bank cards.



A call to the bank.....All the money has been Withdrawn !







#### <u>GANGS</u>

- Encounters with gang members are possible in all areas of Winnipeg
- Recognition of gang members varies. Be wary of groups of youths having similar clothing, hats, tattoos, bandanas, etc.
- Graffiti may be an indicator of a gang's "turf".

## **PANHANDLERS**

- It is best not to give.
- Social agencies are available to provide what most panhandlers urgently need.
- Money usually goes to alcohol or drugs!









- Do not swear or be abusive, a polite "NO" usually works
- Walk and talk confidently
- Never pause and attempt to look in your wallet or purse





## **TRANSIT**

- Use well lit busy bus stops
- Sit near the driver
- Know bus routes and times
- Ask bus drivers for help
- Use "request stop" feature











- Report any abuse or harassment to driver
- Beware of those on and getting off the bus with you

## VEHICLE SAFETY

- Always park in well lit spots
- Do not exit vehicle around suspicious people
  - Never leave valuables in vehicle.









 Equip your vehicle with a anti-theft device (Immobilizer, Car Alarm or Steering wheel club)



• Approach your vehicle with your keys in hand.







- Maintain vehicle in good running condition
- Keeps doors locked at all times
- Don't pick up strangers









- Write down license numbers of erratic drivers.
- If you are a victim of "Road Rage". Do not stop. Call police or drive to a public area.







## DEBIT CARDS AND ATM'S

- Debit cards are an excellent alternative to cash
- When selecting PIN, avoid obvious codes
- Never give PIN to anyone. Even your best friend or partner.







Use ATM's in busy, well lit areas. Especially after dark.

Don't count the money you withdraw at the ATM. Be aware of people lingering or entering with you!































- When to call 911 ?
- Any crime in progress (B&E, Robbery etc.)
- Any situation where people or property are at risk (Fire, Children on Ice, etc. )
- Any Medical emergency (Heart attack, accidental poisoning, etc.)






#### WHEN CONTACTING 911

- Stay on the line
- Stay calm
- Explain the Emergency
- The address of the Emergency



 The Address and Telephone is automatically displayed to the operator from which you are calling from.





- The 911 operator will ask questions to determine what is the Emergency
- The 911 operator will then transfer you to the appropriate Emergency Service
- Police
- Fire
- Paramedics







- Let the operator control the Conversation
- Stay on the line until you are told to hang up
- Operators may stay on the line with you until police arrive







- If you accidentally dial 911
- Stay on the line
- Do not hang up
- If you hang up 911 has to call you back. This wastes valuable time. Police will also respond to confirm wellbeing





- If you are unsure if it is a emergency, call 911
- If it is not a Emergency they will simply ask you to call the Non-Emergency number 204-986-6222





- Circumstances that you feel are suspicious
- A crime that has occurred but the offender / suspects have left
- Non Emergency 204-986-6222

- YOUR ADDRESS
- YOUR DATE OF BIRTH
- YOUR TELEPHONE #





#### WHAT WILL THE POLICE ASK ?

- WHAT THE NATURE OF THE PROBLEM
- WHAT DID YOU SEE OR
  WITNESS
- YOU MAY BE ASKED TO PROVIDE A STATEMENT.

#### WHEN SPEAKING TO POLICE OR 911



If there was a suspect include :

- Description of suspect:
  - Male/ Female, Height, Weight, Build, Hair style,
  - Facial hair, tattoos
  - Demeanor ( Actions )
  - Clothing Identifiers
  - Weapons
  - Direction of Travel

#### IF AN INCIDENT INVOLVES A (VEHICLE)

- RECORD PLATE NUMBER.
- MAKE, MODEL & YEAR OF VEHICLE.
- COLOR
- UNUSUAL MARKS (RUST, DENTS, ETC).
- NUMBER OF OCCUPANTS
- LAST DIRECTION OF TRAVEL.

## When an incident occurs...

- If you remember something after the police have left, you can always phone them back
- Sometimes the smallest bits of information help police solve a crime
- Refer to the police incident number you were given.

- Learn about valuable crime prevention information and tips
